Bringing REAL Energy Efficiency to North Carolina!

What is NC SAVE\$? NC SAVE\$ is a proposal by 14 consumer, social justice, senior and environmental groups to create an independent (non-utility) energy efficiency program to make the economic and environmental benefits of energy efficiency and conservation available statewide. The NC Utilities Commission recently agreed to consider NC SAVE\$. Visit www.NCSavesEnergy.org to see the full proposal.

Who would NC SAVE\$ help? All North Carolinians, with a commitment to spread the savings, jobs and environmental benefits as widely as possible, especially to low income consumers, through diverse, cost-effective programs.

How would NC SAVE\$ work? The program could be funded initially by a small consumption fee on utility bills or a public bond, and governed by a non-profit or an existing "public benefit" organization. Installations and services would be carried out by non-profit and for-profit contractors, and all programs would be reviewed annually for cost-effectiveness and overall value to the public. Services would be available to all energy customers, and could include efficiency measures for gas and other fuels, too. Programs could include weatherizing homes, appliance maintenance and upgrades, energy efficiency technology like timers for lights and a/c and any other cost-effective activity. Families would get help with costs of efficiency technology by allowing financing over time, so they'd get savings on energy bills while paying off the improvements. Six states have implemented statewide programs, lowering energy costs for millions of customers, creating thousands of jobs and reducing greenhouse gases by millions of tons a year. Why not just let the electric utilities run their own efficiency programs, like Duke Energy's "Save-a-Watt"? The mission of the utilities is to generate and distribute power for a profit. Expecting utilities to manage energy efficiency involves an inherent conflict of interest, rather like paying Krispy Kreme to design your diet plan. Most of the economic benefits of energy efficiency go to utility shareholders instead of customers. Programs like "Save-a-Watt" charge too much and accomplish too little. An independently administered program would have a mission to carry out cost-effective efficiency activities in the public interest.
